PUBLIC POLICY



It would be strange if so potent a link to power as the American vote were not periodically under attack, as indeed it has been, in three forms: vote addition, vote subtraction, and vote flipping. The first of these, the rarest, is, ironically, the form that has stimulated most popular activism. Such retail fraud, amateurs adding votes one at a time, actually has occurred. Tammany Hall has bribed individuals to make second passes at the polls, having shaved off a moustache or donned a different hat. There have been few such sightings in the twenty-first century; however, records suggest that nowadays an ordinary political outsider would be more likely to be struck by lightning -- doubtless due to the dauntingly high risk/reward ratio for such an effort.

The odds are better for political insiders in a position to alter votes wholesale. LBJ's clumsy ballot stuffing, however, was a poor model for the ambitious. Vote subtraction, rather than addition, is the key. Subtraction in 1863 differed from that of 1963 in theory if not in practice. Earlier barriers concerned themselves with who (freedmen and women) must not vote. Later, the concern was with whom targets must not vote for. Constituencies can be scientifically identified and located. A carefully placed billboard advertising the wrong election date was a crude device not to be recommended, but voting can be made nearly impossible for some neighborhoods, and strategic culling of voter rolls is hard to trace because legitimate culling also exists and provides camouflage.

The emergence of vote flipping makes the above shenanigans seem quaint; computer hacking cannot be matched for speed, efficiency, convenience, and obscurity. And, some claim, for ease. Technocrats are unanimous that most current computers are nearing their use-by dates. Many have been built and maintained by corporations with political connections. Global vulnerability has been widely suspected, spanning Europe and the Americas. The good news is that significant disruption would likely require the enormous resources of a nation-state. The bad news is that slight disruption might be enough. A bad actor need not select his own candidate; merely destroying trust would be devastating. Comfortingly, the above is clearly conspiracy theory.

Galveston Trip to the Bryan Museum and The Great Storm of 1900 Film

The second trip of our Cultural Activities season will be on **Monday, October 24,** when we'll start our Galveston adventure with a visit to the Pier 21 Theater to watch a newly digitally restored, high definition version of this long-popular film about the deadliest natural disaster in US history. This documentary shares the personal stories of survivors and the recovery of Galveston following the great storm.

We will then lunch at the Olympia Grill at Pier 21 which was voted Galveston's best restaurant last year. We will order from the menu and pay with separate checks.

After lunch we will visit the new Bryan Museum located in the Gothic Revival building that once housed the Galveston Orphans Home, one of the most famous survivors of the Great Storm. The Museum, contents of which were assembled by J. P. Bryan, presents his collection of 70,000 items – the largest collection of historical artifacts, documents and artwork relating to the southwestern United States which spans 2,500 years of history. It also includes exhibits dedicated to the history of the building and the orphanage.

We will meet our Precinct 3 bus on the southeast corner of Memorial City Mall parking lot (corner of Barryknoll & Memorial City Way) and depart promptly at 9:00 a.m. We expect to return by 5:00 p.m. or sooner depending on traffic. Total cost for the day is \$15.00 excluding your lunch.
