The Honorable Annise Parker spent many years in service to the people of Houston, America's 4th largest city, with six years as a City Council member, six years as City Controller, and six years as Mayor. She is one of only two women to have been elected mayor.

In addition to her duties as mayor, Parker was a member of President Obama's Task Force on Climate Preparedness and Resilience, and chaired the U.S. Conference of Mayors Criminal and Social Justice Committee. She is a past Fellow of the Institute of Politics at Harvard's John F. Kennedy School of Government.



In 2010 Time magazine named Mayor Parker one of the 100 most influential people in the world. She was named top US mayor and seventh ranked world mayor in 2014 by City Mayors Foundation.

Mayor Parker is currently a Fellow at the Doerr Institute for New Leaders at Rice University and is a member of the U.S. Department of Homeland Security Secretary's Advisory Council.

Mayor Parker is a second generation native Houstonian. She graduated from Rice University with a Bachelor of Arts Degree. In the private sector, Parker spent 20 years working in the oil and gas industry. She also co-owned Inklings, a lesbian/feminist bookstore for 10 years.

Parker and her wife Kathy Hubbard have been together for more than 25 years and are advocates for adoption, with three daughters and a son.

PUBLIC POLICY

Those who choose to defy the Victorian taboo on discussing politics in polite society may get a nasty reminder of why the taboo evolved in the first place. It'll be

particularly shocking to anyone who took high school civics seriously. The application of logic to marshaled evidence is likely to be regarded as proof of vulgarity or even



neurosis. Certainly naïveté. Not that your interlocutors won't be voting. They almost certainly will, but if you disagree politically their attitude will seem as boneheadedly intractable to you as yours will to them. Welcome to the age of identity politics. Most voters anticipate affirming their membership in a community with far more enthusiasm than they count on having their one voice among millions decide the fate of the nation.

Not that this rather emotional approach to voting lacks adversaries. It is particularly lamented by partisans who beg perfectionists not to "throw their vote away" on a third-party candidate. These pragmatists are baffled by the indifference of purists to the actual outcome of refusing to choose "the lesser of two evils." The idealists are similarly shocked that they should be expected to vote for "someone they don't believe in." One can virtually shriek: "This is not a spiritual exercise," or "less privileged citizens than you will be devastated," or "you're irrational." It's no good. There is an implacable misfit between two people who are likely to be in complete agreement about the candidate of their dreams, and they feel more hostility than they would quarreling with utter adversaries. As in the Spanish Inquisition, apostates are more reviled than heretics. Both political parties eat their own.

The selection of a voting community is, of course, subconscious, and it may change over time. The criteria are interrelated: social class, religion, region, age, income, educational attainment or aspiration, ethnicity, race, sexual preference, gender, and, often, fear and resentment. I'd like to think generosity, duty, and gratitude sometimes play a part, too. Attitudes toward the past and the future are important. For AAUW members, especially this year, gender might be expected to play an important role, but it may be trumped (so to speak) by other factors, such as marital status. There is a welldocumented, if partial, difference between probable voting behavior of married and unmarried women. An interplay between age and gender is also well-documented. Aging men become more conservative, aging women less so. Go figure.

You already knew all this from common-sense observation and perhaps by reading recently published neuroscience regarding the predominantly irrational nature of our decision making. It doesn't bother everyone, but perhaps it should. Our democracy was invented under a very different, eighteenth-century view of mankind. After a mere two centuries, it's survival is still up for grabs. Fretful types trying to argue politics at the Thanksgiving table may be more valuable than is obvious.

Our spectacular 2016-17 Cultural Activities season kicks off on **Wednesday, September 28,** with a return visit to The Menil where we'll experience the newly-acquired folk art collection – "As Essential as Dreams"- donated by Houstonian Stephanie Smirther just prior to her recent passing. This art was created by self-taught artists, and includes fifty pieces that cover the gamut of mediums and styles, from calligraphy to woodworking to painting, and to just plain innovation and fun.

But first we'll start our multi-faceted experience with a visit to the Rothko Chapel with a brief explanation of the meditative atmosphere among the Rothko paintings. We'll then proceed to the Phillip-Johnson-designed Museum where, we'll experience its extensive collection of contemporary



art as well as ethnic pieces, that include the previously mentioned Smirther collection, plus "Picasso: The Line" and various other permanent collections of African and Pacific art.
