NOVEMBER MEMBERSHIP MEETING

Dr. Jenny Chang Director of Methodist Hospital Cancer Center

Dr. Jenny Chang, director of the Cancer Center at Methodist Hospital since 2010, is an internationally acclaimed oncology researcher and clinician whose major interest is breast cancer. She coordinates all the cancer care at Methodist's seven hospitals, including research and clinical trials. She hopes President Obama's 1 billion dollar "Moonshot" will jump start funding to eliminate cancer as we know it.



As a child in Singapore in the 1970s and 80s she watched seven of her relatives, including a 9-year-old cousin, succumb to cancer after repeated rounds of chemotherapy. She earned an MD from the University of Cambridge in 1989, interned at the Royal Marsden Hospital/Institute for Cancer Research, and was awarded a Research Doctorate from the University of London where she specialized in breast cancer. After a year at Singapore's National University she moved to Houston in hopes of breaking the "glass ceiling" she had

experienced overseas.

On average it takes 15 years to bring a new drug to market so Dr. Chang and her colleagues are examining new uses for older drugs. She is a leader in developing a cancer drug that kills breast tumor cells that survive chemotherapy and holds patents on new technological advances including molecular profiling. Her "Smart Bomb" theory is in clinical trials at Methodist, one of two locations in the United States.

In addition to her duties at Methodist Hospital she is a professor at Weill Medical College. Dr. Chang has been named one of America's top doctors and received "Compassionate Doctor" recognition in 2015. "We are here to be a partner through a difficult time. We help patients holistically, not only caring for the cancer, but caring for the patient."

PUBLIC POLICY

AAUW's history parallels that of the progressive movement of which it was a part. Its tiny initial membership was overshadowed by WCTU crusaders, etc. Women college graduates were rare to the point of oddity. This boom in women's organizations had an importance we can scarcely comprehend now. It was their only voice. AAUW, however, did not become politically active until the sixties, but other nineteenth-century groups were famously less reserved.

They had their reasons. The appeal of a horsewhipped wife had been rejected in court. Even the worst father could claim a mother's children. Husbands pilfered their wives' inheritances. Birth control was illegal. Gradually, in Europe and America, the eighteenth century intellectual revolution and the nineteenth century industrial revolution was remedying such outrages. By 1850, states had begun outlawing wife beating and protecting women's property from their husbands. Domestic violence might be stopped, though arrests were seldom made. At least officially, women eventually won the right to sign contracts, hold jobs, and fight for custody of their children. They won the right to vote in 1920 (the same year a consolidation of several splinter groups was named "AAUW") Women, however, did not begin to vote in numbers as high as men until 1980, perhaps because the daughters of baby boomers were becoming eligible. With "Generation X," a surge of interest followed a 1970s spate of best-selling books (written by boomers) claiming to identify a still unsolved problem.

The ancient cliché pairing "pillage" with "rape" suggests its deep-seated nature. An expose of military rape culture was followed by one describing a problem in some college fraternities and another claiming campus rape in general was commonplace. Coaches and other authorities were accused of defending institutions rather than victims. Judges were said to empathize with "boys" who reminded them of their former selves. Indeed, the American problem appears old enough that some young offenders may now have reached positions of power and fatherly indulgence.

There is a sense in which rape in America's middle class is not impersonal, though there is scant personal relationship between members of the "couple." The psychological bonding experience is between the perpetrator and his male audience, whether or not they were actually present for (or participating in) the event. Telling other men about rape apparently has an enjoyable ritual quality, making the phenomenon truly "fraternal." Young boys expected to prove their masculinity in this environment are almost as much to be pitied as women providing the playground.

Readers can scan medieval and colonial history to reassure themselves that women have progressed. There are travesties too vulgar to be described here. We have indeed "come a long way (baby)" but our ascent has been via a spiral rather than a linear staircase.

MFAH's Exclusive Exhibit "Degas: A New Vision"

Nearly 200,000 visitors flocked to see this incredible exhibition earlier this year in Melbourne, Australia. Now it has come to our own Museum of Fine Arts for its only U.S stop and we'll be among the first to see it when we venture to the Museum on **Tuesday, November 15**.

<u>Degas: A New Vision</u> is the most significant international survey in almost 30 years of the work of 19th century master Edgar Degas. With more than 200 works from public and private collections around the world, the exhibit showcases the continuity of the artist's abiding interest across painting, drawing, photography, printmaking and sculpture from the beginning to the end of his career.F

Not since the landmark international retrospective *Degas* in 1988 has the artist's career been so fully assessed. That exhibition led to a revival of interest in Degas, with dozens of shows focusing on individual subjects of his work – the bathers, the dancers, the jockeys, the portraits – or his influence on other artists. *Degas: A New Vision* benefits from that scholarship, puts Degas back together again, and offers an opportunity to see the artist anew.

Degas's mother was Creole from New Orleans and he lived there for several years. While there he produced some of his best work. In honor of his Louisiana roots, we'll do lunch at Brennan's following the viewing.


