## On Becoming an Author



## Garden Divas



The Garden Divas will venture to Westbury Community Garden (WCG) Tuesday, February 4. It is one of the largest, most successful community gardens in Houston. Becky Edmonson, Westbury Area Improvement Corp. President and Rachel Folkerts, Farm Programs Manager for Plant It Forward Farms will join us for a tour of the garden. WCG is 7 acres owned by the City of Houston and leased to Brays Oaks Management District to be a permanent green space. Daily operations are managed by WCG which is a project of the nonprofit Westbury Area Improvement Corporation. Since its inception in 2010, the garden has won both local and national awards. The mission for the gardens: "The Westbury Community Garden educates adults and children about good nutrition and ecology, strengthens community spirit, provides organically-grown food, and serves as a gathering place for the community." The garden's slogan is "Growing Community through Gardening" and that

is what it does. Located at 12581 Dunlap St., 77035, WCG has successfully created a space where residents of area single-family homes garden with residents from nearby multi-family housing. The gardeners are as diverse as the produce they grow, and they come from all over southwest Houston. People from different backgrounds, cultures, and circumstances come together as gardeners. Currently there are 62 allotment beds, an educational pavilion, a native plant area, an orchard, a tree farm and more. Fundraising for the Master Plan created by Akasura Robinson will kick off this year as part of their 10-year anniversary celebration. Visit the WCG website at https://westburycommunitygarden.org/.

Afterwards, we will visit Politan Row (2445 Times Blvd., 77005); a chef-driven food hall platform featuring a thoughtfully curated mix of local food and beverage talent. Kin by Chef Evelyn uses produce provided by the Westbury Community Garden. The 'Row' offers an elevated food hall experience that encourages the exploration of shareable dishes in beautiful, inviting, and communal spaces. The place looks fascinating!
