# **Public Policy**

#### EVERYTHING IS BIGGER IN TEXAS – EVEN THE AMOUNT OF SCHOOL BOOK BANS! TEXAS LEADS THE NATION IN SCHOOL BOOK BANS!



AAUW members love to read!! This is evident by the multiple book groups that are ongoing in our branch alone. Books in these groups are selected through a process. Any book can be considered. Consensus is reached. Participation is by choice. What if access to books were limited or unavailable? We would be outraged! Much attention has been focused on the second

amendment of the U.S. Constitution and the right to bear arms, but **closer attention needs to be paid to the first amendment** which recognizes freedom of religion, speech, press, peaceable assembly and petitioning of Government for redress of grievances. These freedoms are under attack by special interest groups through inuendo, misinformation and censorship. **It is imperative that we become aware and vigilant of what is going on in our own backyard.** 

Nothing could be closer to our own backyards than local schools, libraries and independent Blue Willow Bookshop owner and branch member, Valerie Kohler. When Texas Rep. Matt Kraus first announced his list of books to investigate in the fall of 2021, Valerie posted a statement expressing her opposition in her business newsletter. With Valerie's permission, her statement is posted again in this public policy section of our branch newsletter.

Blue Willow Bookshop is appalled by Rep. Matt Krause's Texas House Committee investigation into public schools' libraries. The freedom to read is a constitutional right that should be cherished and celebrated, not exploited as a tool for personal political gain. Not only does this censorious investigation deny Texans that right, but the list of books in question blatantly targets stories centering on BIPOC and LGBTQIA characters, as well as educational books on subjects such as sex, gender, and American history.

Censorship doesn't belong in Texas classrooms—educators do. Rep. Krause's demands, which steamroll the reconsideration policies and procedures each library already has in place, actively keep Texas educators away from their students and prevent them from doing their jobs during a public health crisis that Krause himself has shown little urgency to address.


Dr. Rudine Sims Bishop said it best: Books are "windows, mirrors, and sliding glass doors." It is so important for all readers to see themselves in books and to have the opportunity to get a glimpse into the lives and experiences of others-even if they "might make students feel discomfort."

Blue Willow Bookshop is proud to have hosted and supported many of the incredible authors on the list of books to be "investigated," and we look forward to continuing to work with our amazing Texas educator partners to get these books into students' hands.

Parents have the right to decide what their own children do or do not read. No one has the right to make that decision for others, specially not democratically elected officials. We will always defend the freedom to read—and celebrate each book that provides a window, mirror, or sliding glass door.

This past fall, AAUW-Texas surveyed all members to determine which topics were of most importance to pursue as an organization. Of the multiple topics on the list, book banning was among the top four selected by members to be the AAUW public policy priorities for 2022-2024.

In August 2022, The Texas Library Association published an article titled *Restrictive School Board Policies Threaten the Right to Read.* "The new school year was barely a day old before school districts across Texas began announcing new policies designed to restrict access to books in school libraries and classrooms, to the detriment of students and their families. While they justify these steps as being in the best interest of their communities, these actions are driven by political pressure from individuals and organized groups working to impose their own agendas on



Texas public schools and every single family that sends children to these schools"

According to analysis in a report titled *Banned in the USA: The Growing Movement to Censor Books in School*, released in September, 2022 by Pen America (a 100- year-old organization focused on the protection of literary expression and human rights) the large majority of book bans underway today are not spontaneous, organic expressions of citizen concern. Rather, they reflect the work of a growing number of advocacy organizations that have made demanding censorship in schools of certain books and ideas part of their mission.

This climate is increasingly **undermining the professional discretion of educators and librarians** when it comes to matters of public education. This is disrupting the potential for effective relationships between parents, teachers and administrators that can actually serve to advance student learning and civic engagement.

The Pen report paints a deeply concerning picture for access to literature in schools, and diverse literature in particular, in the coming (this) school year. Book banning and educational gag orders are two fronts in an allout war on education and the open discussion and debate of ideas in America. Students have First Amendment rights to access information and ideas in schools, and these bans and legislative shifts pose clear threats to those rights.



**Currently, in our own backyard, all book vendors are under a moratorium in SBISD until a new policy is formed.** Our valued Blue Willow Bookshop is among those on this moratorium list. Also included are author visits, and Scholastic Book Fares. **The SBISD school board approves all vendors.** The SBISD school board meets on Monday, January 9 and January 23 at 6 p.m. at the SBISD Administration Building, 955 Campbell Rd.

The Free Speech Center at Middle Tennessee State University describes the negative effects of book banning: "Removing books has a negative impact **because it is censorship.** When you censor certain ideas and beliefs, you create a more xenophobic and ignorant society. **This is teaching students that it is okay to stop an idea or viewpoint from being heard because they don't agree with it.** Book banning affects society by having a ripple effect that impinges the rights of other readers. While families have the right to restrict their children from reading certain books, they can't enforce that on other families."
