Funds - \$6 Million Reasons to Celebrate!



Last fall, we kicked off our national fundraising efforts with the message "\$6 Million Reasons to C h a r g e! Ahead," a reference to the \$6 million in grants and fellowships that AAUW provides to women around the world.

This month West Harris County fundraising finished the year with an awesome performance sure to stir the envy of other branches around the state and beyond. While other branches sometimes resort to labor-intensive fundraisers (as many of us can remember doing in

past years), our fun-filled May 7 Talbots Style Show generated almost \$1,800 for AAUW in Washington, D.C., with relatively minimal effort. Combined with our equally successful Home Alone Fall Ball non-event last October through December, we have surpassed the annual fundraising goal we set back in August!

Forty WHC members attended our spring style show and introduced 10 guests to our dynamic branch. As an incentive to increase branch membership next year, there was no cost for potential new branch members to attend this event. Almost 90% of supporters reserved their seats by logging in to aauw.org and making a donation by credit card. This allowed donors to choose their preferred national fund and quickly get a receipt for their tax-deductible donation. Compared to 0% online participation in previous years, this was yet another proud accomplishment for WHC.

Cheryl Smith, Debbie Rossi, Diane Statham, Marie Helmy, Marietta Hostak, Mary Hilton, Miriam Vyles, Peg McNealy, Poupette Farnell, Rose Ennis, and Sharon Jorgeson rocked the runway as this year's style show models, representing only a small fraction of West Harris County's vibrant activity group community.

WHC members Brenda Moss, Carolyn Morris, Debbie Campbell, Diane Statham, Mary Hilton, Sharon Jorgeson, Susan Boone, and the WHC Board worked behind the scenes, making arrangements with Talbots, recruiting models, updating the guest list, and underwriting refreshments.

Once again, Talbots General Manager Chu Nguyen and her team provided a beautiful venue, expert support in styling the latest fashions, and emcees for the event, as well as 30% off our purchases, a generous gift bag to raffle off, and help with refreshments. Mary Andersen won the Talbots gift bag, which included several personal care items and a \$50 Talbots gift card! Public Policy

Diversity, Equity, and Inclusion

During the 88th Texas Legislative session, diversity, equity, and inclusion (DEI) has been in the news. DEI refers to the organizational framework that seeks to promote "the fair treatment and full participation of all people particularly groups who have historically been underrepresented or subject to discrimination." The Texas Senate passed SB 17, "prohibiting differential preference in institutions of higher education on the basis of race, sex, color, ethnicity, or national origin to an applicant for employment, an employee, or a participant in any function of the institution. It also prohibits the institution, except when required by federal law, to establish or maintain a diversity, equity, and inclusion office." SB 17 was voted out of the House's Higher Education Committee allowing the bill to be voted in the House before the session ends on May 29th.

Various organizations including businesses, industry, and educational institutions have DEI policies. These organizations consider DEI when it comes to recruiting, hiring, advancement, and strategic decision making.

Kate McGee, Higher Education Reporter for *The Texas Tribune*, wrote: "Diversity, equity and inclusion offices have become a mainstay on college and university campuses across the country as schools try to boost faculty diversity and help students from all backgrounds succeed. Those who support their existence on college campuses argue the SB 17 legislation will make schools less welcoming places to work and study, turn back efforts to correct past discrimination and stall progress to make universities better reflect state demographics. Yet critics accuse DEI programs of pushing left-wing ideology onto students and faculty and of prioritizing social justice over merit and achievement."



Each of us has our own interests, hobbies, and talents as well as different backgrounds, cultures, and experiences. When we participate in diverse groups, we have opportunities to learn about and appreciate differences which can lead to an appreciation of other's opinions and foster understanding. A well-balanced community will accept different opinions and have reduced fears towards differences. Diverse groups can foster creativity, innovation, empathy, and social cohesion

resulting in settings where individuals are supported, accepted, and have an opportunity to succeed.

In the 1800's women were underrepresented and subjected to discrimination. AAUW has worked for equity for women since its inception. Today it continues that mission. According to the 2023-25 AAUW Public Policy Priorities introduction:

"The Public Policy Priorities underscore AAUW's mission to advance gender equity for women and girls through research, education, and advocacy. The work of AAUW builds upon responsible public participation, and the following priorities provide a basis for AAUW members' actions at the local, state, national, and international levels. Implicit in each is support for government agencies administering programs, including adequate appropriations, effective and accountable administration, and provision for citizen participation. We advocate public discussion to ensure enlightened decisions on these priorities. We work to increase the number of women, and the diversity of backgrounds they represent, including race, ethnicity, age, income, gender, and sexual identity, in policy and other decision-making positions. Our positions are shaped by our commitment to being nonpartisan and fact-based, and to acting with integrity. We strive for our work to be inclusive and intersectional, collaborating with diverse allies and coalitions to achieve equity for all."
