

It is time to VOTE again! School Board Election Day is <u>Saturday</u>, May 4

Early voting will be held <u>April</u> 22 - April 30

According to the National School Boards

Association, school boards "establish the vision and goals for the public schools in their district, and they set standards for the performance of schools and superintendents."

Your school **Board of Trustees**, comprised of seven local citizens, provides an important public service to the community, and serves without compensation. In accordance with the Texas Elections Code, Board elections are held on the first Saturday in May each year. Some districts hold their elections in the fall. Board elections are held at various locations across each district. Board members serve three-year terms. All registered voters who reside within the school district are eligible to cast ballots in Board of Trustees elections.

Many school board meetings are no longer sleepy and boring. Contentious issues (banning books, vaccine policies, CRT, LGBTQ policies, etc.) and fiery protests are becoming more common.

Why vote?

Local election turnout is very small, often only 5-10% of the electorate. Because of this low turnout, these races can be susceptible to the whims of a small number of voters. Many voters don't study the school board candidates. This has allowed candidates who do not share the views of the majority of community residents to take control of school boards.

Research your local races. Know the candidates. Know what's at stake. Support pro-equality, inclusive candidates. Encourage your friends and neighbors to support the candidates who are committed to safety and quality education for all students.

Vote in school board elections. Who runs your school district matters. Remember: Your vote makes the greatest impact in races with the fewest voters. It will make a difference. Even if you do not have children in the school district, your support of public schools matters. Your vote may avoid unpleasant surprises.

WHCB Project to Promote Literacy Donate your books!

As you have read or heard on the news, many school districts are having to cut their budgets for the 2024-2025 school year. This is the result of the legislature not passing sufficient school funding during the last legislative session. To cut costs, Spring Branch ISD is eliminating librarian positions at all schools. Other school districts may take similar steps.

To advance literacy in one low economic neighborhood, our branch is supporting a free library that has been started at Spring Branch Family Development Center (SBFDC). What's needed are books. Gently used (or new) books in either English or Spanish are requested. The SBFDC Free Library can share everything from toddler board books to beginning readers, chapter books, graphic novels, illustrated nonfiction texts, mysteries, and young adult fiction, etc.

Many of you are grandmothers or maybe you are a retired teacher. You may have gently used children's books in your home for entertaining grandchildren who have outgrown them and are no longer used. SAVE THE DATE FRIDAY, MAY 17th.



After a long absence, the group will return to the Houston Public Library Family History Center at the Clayton Campus which houses our city's renown Genealogy Center. If you are interested in family history, this is an excellent place to begin your quest. Started as a small special collection of the Houston Public Library in 1921, the genealogy research collection was originally housed in the Julia Ideson Building in downtown Houston. In 1968, the collection was relocated

to the Clayton House at 5300 Caroline Street in Houston's historic Museum District. This was the former home of Houston businessman and statesman William Lockhart Clayton and wife Susan Vaughan Clayton, who deeded the property to the City of Houston for use as a public library. Built in 1916-17, the Clayton's Georgian Revival house features Tuscan columns, paneled pilasters, elliptical fanlight over the front door, and fan lit dormers on the roof. The home became a Texas Historic Landmark in 1988.

A special guest on our tour of the center and home will be a descendant of the Clayton family, who will share stories of growing up in the area. You won't want to miss it. Garden Divas

The Garden Divas will visit the John Fairey Garden owned by The John Fairey Garen Conservation Foundation on Tuesday, April 2. This garden has been widely acclaimed for the originality of its design, the breadth of its collections, and its education and conservation programs. The garden features an extraordinary variety of plants that are well-suited to the climate of central Texas and the Texas gulf coast. The garden contains more than 3,000 plants (1000 unique taxa) from Mexico, Asia, and the United States. The mission of The John Fairey Garden Conservation Foundation is to preserve, share, and advance the horticultural and artistic legacy of John Fairey. The garden is a preservation garden of The Garden




Conservancy, ensuring it will remain as John Fairey intended, in perpetuity. Their website (https://jfgarden.org) has a wealth of information that I encourage you to review prior to the trip.

The John Fairey Garden is located at 20559 F.M. 359 Road, Hempstead, Texas. We will carpool from Memorial City from the lot South of Barryknoll leaving at 8:30 a.m. See the address above if you prefer to meet us at the Garden. The fee for a private tour is \$25 per person. Our tour is scheduled for 9:30 a.m. If you become a member, then the cost is only \$10. Membership information can be found on the website. (Senior membership is only \$35!) There is also a nursery that we can visit where we will have access to some of the garden's outstanding plants. A large part of the foundation's mission is to make uncommon and distinctive plants available for sale to guests and other botanical gardens. The sale plants are propagated from the garden and from plants collected around the world.
