Houston Public Library Family History Center

After a long absence, the group will return to the Houston Public Library Family History Center at the Clayton Campus which houses our city's renown Genealogy Center. If you are interested in family history, this is an excellent place to begin your quest. Started as a small special collection of the Houston Public Library in 1921, the genealogy research collection was originally housed in the Julia Ideson Building in downtown Houston. In 1968, the collection was relocated to the Clayton House at 5300 Caroline Street in Houston's historic Museum District.



This was the former home of Houston businessman and statesman William Lockhart Clayton and wife Susan Vaughan Clayton, who deeded the property to the City of Houston for use as a public library. Built in 1916-17, the Clayton's Georgian Revival house features Tuscan columns, paneled pilasters, elliptical fanlight over the front door, and fan lit dormers on the roof. The home became a Texas Historic Landmark in 1988.

A special guest on our tour of the center and home will be a descendant of the Clayton family, who will share stories of growing up in the area. You won't want to miss it.
