#### Thomsen-Baker-Telfer Needs You!

Something wonderful happened at the September Branch Monthly Meeting! The dollar amount of our \$10,000 matching grant was reached. The total after the meeting was **61 members** who have donated **\$10,260.** The \$10,000 from our anonymous donor is within our reach. We need to meet 50% of the total membership to collect \$10,000 and pass go. In other words, we need a total of **80 members** to donate in order to reach the 50% goal.

We know there are 19 members who can make a donation, so that we reach our goal of 80 participating members. This matching grant is too great an opportunity to allow it to slip through our fingers.

How can I give my donation? Donations can be mailed to Mary Andersen 5426 Wigton Drive, Houston 77096 or paid by Zelle to ThomsenBakerTelferScholarship@gmail.com. Don't trust the mail? Look on page 5 of the directory for a list of scholarship board members. Call or email any one of them. They will happily pick up your donation.

The matching grant is for \$10,000 to be matched by 50% or more of the WHC membership by November 28, 2024. The amount, deadline and 50% participation by the membership are firm conditions. We need to collect a minimum of \$10,000 and the funds donated must come from at least 80 members (50% of 160 members in August 2024). As of September 22, 2024, we have received \$10,260 from 61 members. Thank you to all the members who have gotten us this far. We still have a long way to go. To be clear, even though we have reached the monetary goal of \$10,000, if we do not have at least 80 members donating to the Scholarship Fund by November 28, 2024, Thomsen-Baker-Telfer will not receive the matching \$10,000.

You can be part of a young woman's dream education. The selection committee carefully chooses deserving young women with high aspirations. They have BIG dreams of advanced degrees which will take a great deal of money.

#### THE KELLUM NOBLE HOUSE STORY

#### Wednesday, October 16

The Culture Interest group has a special outing planned to the Heritage Society where the group will tour the oldest house in Houston still standing on its' original location. Built in 1847, you will learn the story of this stately home, its owners, occupants, and the first school in town run by a woman. You will learn the Kellum Noble house story with a docent who will bring back the

days when Texas was a Republic. A special guest from Preservation Houston will lead us through the multiyear restoration of the building. As time permits, we will explore other houses on the Women's History Tour. You will learn about:

- Zerviah Noble's contribution to Houston history, including hosting a private school before public schools existed in the city.
- Progressive, educated, and talented women who helped change the shape of property ownership rights, voting rights, the school system, and the Arts scene.
- How the house was designated as a UNESCO site in 2022 as part of its "Slave Route Project.
- Original "Texas Furniture" made by German cabinetmakers.
- The "Mexican American History & Culture in 20th Century Houston" mural in Connally Plaza.
