How to Contact Your Texas Legislators

Communicating with your local and state officials can be as simple as writing an email or making a phone call. You can visit your official's local office or attend town hall meetings. If possible, get to know your representatives before Legislative session begins. When the Texas legislature is in session you can testify during hearings, talk to lawmakers and their staff at their Capitol offices.

Texans can easily find their representatives, and their respective contact information, through Texas Legislature Online, TLO. Here are

- In the page's lower right corner find "Who Represents Me?" Enter your address. You will see your elected representatives from national to Texas state level.
- Click on the legislator you are wanting to contact and a screen will pop up with a box in the upper right hand corner titled E-MAIL YOUR ______. That has a form to create an email to your selected representative.

To maximize your impact, it is best to have researched the issues and bills being considered. You can do this through TLO. Near the top center of the home page, you will find "Search Legislation." Be sure to select the current Legislature, "89(R) – 2025" to get bills for the current session. You can enter the number of the bill. If you don't know the specific number for the bill, you can use the "Word/Phrase" option. That will show you several bills that are related to your interests.

When you contact a legislator by email about a topic or bill, be specific and state your concerns in a positive, polite manner. Start with the positive before the negative. List Bill number(s) when available.

To go beyond an initial email or call, ask for the legislative aide for that topic to contact you and give your contact information. If you contact your legislator in person, plan to stay 10 -15 minutes or less and when calling the office, be prepared and talk only a few minutes.

Express your stand on a certain issue by providing specific examples of why you support or oppose an issue, bill, or law. Be brief and focused on one issue. Elected officials or their staff want your perspective on how a bill impacts you. The staff will keep track of how many people take a position on a bill or issue. You can make a difference. Just remember that specific legislation may take three or more legislative sessions to get enough traction to be passed. That means you might need to be dedicated to more than one legislative session.

These parks are in Bellaire, just inside Loop 610 on Evergreen Dr. between Bellaire Blvd and Newcastle Street. Russ Pitman Park was the inspiration of Hana Ginzbarg, a visionary, who wanted a place where Houston's natural heritage of prairie and wetlands could be shared and appreciated by Houstonians of all ages. Happy New Year to fellow opera lovers! The famous Verdi opera, Aida, will broadcast live from the Metropolitan Opera in New York at Cinemark Theatre Memorial City on Saturday, January 25th at 11:30 a.m. (note early start time)! Tosca in November was outstanding and Aida in January will be exceptional. Music Director Yannick Nezet-Seguin will conduct this opera full of all the pomp and circumstance of ancient Egypt. Verdi's operas, as mentioned in the previous newsletter, continue to be performed throughout the world. Aida was first performed on December 24, 1871 at the Khedivial Opera House, Cairo, Egypt. Next, with Verdi in attendance, it had its European premiere on February 8,



1872 at La Scala in Milan, Italy. This opera of love, loyalty, and betrayal should not be missed. New staging by Michael Mayer will include dazzling animations and intricate projections taking attendees inside towering pyramids and gilded Egyptian tombs. Aida's Triumphal March is a classic for all times and should not be missed. The costumes, sets, arias, and the Met's superb chorus are awaiting your arrival! Join us after the opera as we walk over to the Cheesecake Factory following the opera to chat about the opera and catch up with each other.

Culture Group

On Wednesday, January 22nd, the Cultural Interest Group will be visiting POST HOUSTON located downtown near Buffalo Bayou. It has a long and storied history. Established as a depot next to Houston's Grand Central Station in 1934, the present-day structure was designed by the same architectural firm that built the Astrodome. The new building became the Houston headquarters of the USPS in 1961. In 1984. the Post Office was named after Barbara Jordan, the first African American woman elected to the Texas Senate. The HUGE structure was redeveloped in 2015 as the POST, one of the jewels on the downtown scene, a hub for culture, food and recreation. Noteworthy is the rooftop Skylawn and garden, a state-of-the-art Music Hall and an International Food Hall with 25+ vendors. You WILL enjoy the food and the view! We meet at our usual Memorial City Mall

Our free guided tour will start at 11:00 a.m. Early arrivers can wait inside at the Eden Plants and Coffee Shop on the first floor. The POST is located at 401 Franklin Street, 77201. Going back to our roots at the Clayton Family

After a long absence, the Culture Interest Group will return to our city's renown Genealogy Center in the Museum District. If you are interested in family history research, OR wish to explore the William Clayton Family history, their home, this is a trip you cannot miss! Started as a small special collection of the Houston Public Library in 1921, the genealogy research center relocated to the Clayton estate in Houston's historic Museum District. This was the former home of Houston businessman and statesman William Lockhart Clayton and wife Susan Vaughan Clayton. Built in 1916-17, the Clayton's Georgian Revival house features Tuscan columns, paneled pilasters, an elliptical fanlight over the front door, and fanlit dormers on the roof. The home became a Texas Historic Landmark in 1988. A special guest on our tour of the center and home will be a descendant of the Clayton family, who will share stories of growing up in the area.
